

## Wilton Windmill

Wiltshire's only working windmill open again to visitors.



Thanks to an early Easter, Wilton Windmill will be open for more days than ever this summer.

The Windmill will open on March 31<sup>st</sup>, Easter Day, and April 1<sup>st</sup>, Easter Monday, and thereafter on Sundays and Bank Holidays until September 29<sup>th.</sup>

Guided tours will run between 2pm and 5pm and the Granary Museum will be available to explore.

Hot and cold drinks, ice creams and cakes will be available in

the shepherd's hut and visitors are most welcome to bring their own picnics. The site, of course, remains open for picnickers throughout the year even when the mill is closed.

Special attractions this year include the return on Saturday June 15<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 16th of the popular Smoke and Mirrors Theatre Company with their not-wholly serious **Murder Mystery.** This year it's *Burying the Hatchet* – a story of skulduggery in a Michelin starred restaurant in Wiltshire. It's a memorable way to spend a summer evening and comes complete with our own gourmet hog-roast and well-stocked bar.

The Windmill will also be open on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> May to celebrate the National Mills Weekend.

There are also plans for another **Open Day** in July as well as a **Vintage Car Meet** in August and **National Heritage Open Days** on September 14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th.</sup>

### Hungerford Heritage Trail/Visit Hungerford Website



The project promotes visiting Hungerford and is aimed at attracting tourists and visitors to the town/North Wessex Downs National Landscape, via a new tourism website and Heritage Trail that can be accessed on line and promoted locally. ### Ramsbury Community Charity Shop

After 14 years at Hills Stores in Ramsbury High Street, the new Ramsbury Community Charity Shop has moved into the partly redundant public loo building in the Memorial Hall car park, which has been recently reconfigured.



The Charity Shop acts as a fund-raising facilitator for the village organisations which help to man it. In the 14 years that the Charity Shop has been operating, £125,000 has been

shared by these organisations, currently: Scouts, Bowls Club, Holy Cross Church, Ramsbury Lunch Club, Ramsbury Recreation Centre, Ravensbury Players and the WI. The shop is run entirely by

### Wilcot, Huish & Oare Parish Council, Replacement of Benches

The Parish Council agreed to replace two benches in the parish, both of which had become unsafe and are beyond repair. Both benches had historical links to former residents and councillors. The plaques will be retained for fixing to the new benches, alongside any new plaques to be agreed. Both benches are sited within the NWDNL, with the Huish bench near the noticeboard, just where the road follows the ancient Holloway into the centre of this hamlet nestling in the valley, where residents and walkers can appreciate the surrounding landscape of farms and hills. Huish Down is also the natural meeting place for the few residents to congregate and chat, or to wait for the new sustainable on-demand bus service. The Oare bench is near the noticeboard and history board, ideally located for walkers heading to or from Giant's Grave and the Old Ox Path.

### A Rain Garden Design for Oare Primary School



Oare Primary School are looking to create a 'Rain Garden' in a currently under used and uninspiring space within the school grounds. A 'Rain Garden' will use plants that are able to withstand waterlogging for up to 48 hours and provide an opportunity to manage rainwater run-off from hard surfaces, whilst creating a low maintenance, but biodiverse environment for pupils to enjoy and learn through.

The plan is to incorporate a polytunnel into the space so that the children can grow their own fruits and vegetables and learn about the importance of food choices, and sustainable growing practices.
